INTRODUCING THE STORY

Ask children to describe what they do on vacation. Ask if any of them have ever slept out in a tent. Then tell them that the story they will read is about to best friends who go on vacation together and decide to sleep out in a tent.

CROSS-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Social Studies: Where in the World Are the Poconos?

Show children a map of the northeastern United States. Point out the state of Pennsylvania to the class. Have children draw their own maps of Pennsylvania. Then help them locate the Poconos Mountains on the map and draw them on the maps. Children can even label the spot in the Poconos where they think Amber Brown's vacation house might be.

Language Arts: Homophones

Amber Brown and Justin have some fun with real and made-up homophones: dear/deer, Poconos/poke-a-nose. Divide children into pairs and have each pair think of two sets of homophones and use each pair of words in sentences. Encourage them to make the sentences as funny as they can. Volunteers can read their sentences aloud to the class.

Science: Animals of the Poconos

Amber is afraid that a grizzly bear might interrupt the sleepover – but do grizzlies live in the Poconos? Have children work in groups to use reference and nonfiction books to find out what animals make their home in the Poconos Mountains. Groups can list five animals each and report on what they learn to the class.

Art: Design a Vacation House

Amber and Justin's vacation house is just about perfect. Ask children to design and draw a picture of a vacation house they would like to have. Encourage them to put in details they'd like, such as playground equipment, swimming pool, tree house, playhouse, and so on. Display children's designs in the classroom.

INTERNET ACTIVITY

Before you send children to do research using any of the keywords listed below, you may wish to try them yourself to be sure the sites are suitable.

Picturing the Poconos

Have children use the keyword Poconos to find pictures of the mountains on the Internet. Children can print out a picture of the area that appeals to them, or can locate an attraction that they would find interesting if they were vacationing there. Encourage them to share their findings with the class.
